Grace and peace to you in the name of God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.



"While serving as a missionary in Laos," tells John Hess-Yoder, "I discovered an illustration of the kingdom of God."

"Before the colonists imposed national boundaries, the kings of Laos and Vietnam reached an agreement on taxation in the border areas. Those who ate short-grain rice built their houses on stilts, and decorated them with Indian-style serpents were considered Laotians. On the other hand, those who ate long-grain rice built their houses on the ground, and decorated them with Chinese-style dragons were considered Vietnamese."

"The exact location of a person's home was not what determined his or her nationality. Instead, each person belonged to the kingdom whose cultural values he or she exhibited."

So it is with us: we live in the world, but as part of God's kingdom—we are to live according to his kingdom's standards and values. [Craig Brian Larson, *Leadership Journal*]

As we enter the month of June, 2020, our communities and state, our nation and world are struggling with a tiny little virus that has been wreaking a vast and terrible toll upon the peoples and the economies of this earth. Who would have thought?

Actually, some did think of such a possibility and have been warning our governments for years, but largely their concerns were seen as alarmist and little or nothing was done. Again, who would have thought?

So here we are in the midst of an epidemic. Our scientists are warning us of the continued health risks and laying out strategies to slow and arrest the spread of the virus. Our economists are warning us of the continued risk to our economy and laying out strategies to restart and accelerate it. Largely these two tracks *seem* to be in competition with one another, and many people think that it has to be one way or the other—that one path is right and the other path is wrong. I personally feel sorry for our various governmental leaders on the state, county, and local levels. While national leaders (on both sides of the aisle) seem to me to be more intent on posturing and blaming the other side for the crisis to reap political gains, these more local governmental leaders are left to try to navigate these very choppy waters as best they can with what seems like a broken oar and a map that reads "uncharted seas"—as few, if any, of these leaders (or any of us) have been through anything like this before.

While it is easy for us to fault these leaders for being too strict or not strict enough, for being too slow or too quick to take action, I feel we should be commending most of these men and women who have been making some very difficult decisions while under incredible pressure. And, while I don't necessarily agree with all of their decisions, I am impressed that, at least in our area, these leaders have done their homework and have been very open about the information and criteria they have been using to make their decisions.

I think it must also be said that few of the decisions these leaders have had to make and will have to make are between clear cut right and wrong options—because each option likely will have many and various repercussions along with some unforeseen and unintended consequences.

Rather than being so quick to criticize and reject our leaders decisions, I hope we, as conscientious Christians, might pause for a moment, remembering and reorienting ourselves to the standards and values of Christ Jesus, who came to usher in the kingdom of God. A given decision might very well affect me adversely or infringe upon my freedom, but maybe it helps or even saves a lot more people in greater need than me.

I don't mean to say that we should give a blank check to our leaders just because they are our leaders. Rather, I believe our leaders need us to be praying for them regularly, and encouraging them to make thoughtful, compassionate, principled decisions. And we, too, need to be thoughtful, compassionate, and principled. We need to do our best to live by the standards and values of God's kingdom—the greatest of which is love.

The road ahead may well be hard—maybe even harder than the road behind. It may well call for even greater sacrifice—but, most often, the greatest sacrifices bring the greatest rewards. Have faith, we will get through this—because God is good, even when we don't perceive him. God is faithful, even when we don't see it.

Pastor Ron Mehl tells about a dear old saintly woman who was gradually losing her memory. Throughout her life this woman had cherished and depended upon the Word of God, committing to memory many verses from her King James Version of the Bible. Her favorite verse was 2 Timothy 1:12: "For I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day."

As time went on, details began to blur in her mind. Eventually she was confined to her bed in a nursing home. As her family members came and visited with her, she would still quote verses of Scripture, especially her favorite verse. But, as she declined, even parts of this well-loved verse began to slip away.

"I know whom I have believed," she would say. "He is able to keep . . . what I have committed to him." Her voice grew weaker, and verse became shorter over time-"What I have committed . . . to him."

Eventually, her voice became so faint that family members had to bend their ears near her mouth to hear the few whispered words on her lips. At the end, there was only one word of her favorite verse left. "Him."

As she lay dying she whispered it again and again as she lay at the threshold of heaven. "Him . . . Him . . . Him." It was all that was left; but it also was all that was needed.

So, let us, too, cling to him always. Because with "Him" we are far better people and our world is a far better place than when we forget or ignore "Him." With "Him," in "Him," and through "Him" we will prevail.

Dear Little Bethany & New Life Lutheran Churches;

We are looking forward to the day that we can all worship in person again. Governor Tim Walz recently announced he is willing to let churches open at 25% occupancy. Though we understand that faith practices are important New Life & Little Bethany Lutheran Churches, as well as most other ELCA churches, do not plan on hosting in-person, indoor public worship services or events until further notice, this could mean for the remainder of the summer months or possibly longer.

That being said, we are trying to provide varied worship opportunities to better serve all of our members. We will continue to provide an online worship service each week; we are trying to provide better audio for that service. We are also planning to provide in person, parking lot services on Sunday mornings at 8:45 am at Little Bethany and 10:00 am at New Life. All services will be drive-in, no-contact services. We ask that you remain in your vehicles, tune in your radio to the frequency listed on the sign provided. If you feel the need, you can sit outside of your vehicle as long as you stay near your vehicle and practice safe social distancing, remaining at least 6 feet away from others. In addition, we ask that you use every other parking space to maintain the 6 feet of distance. There will be a basket for offering provided at the front of the building. All you need to do is drive by and drop your offering in, please do not walk up to the basket for the safety of our service groups. These services are tentatively planned to begin on June 7<sup>th</sup>. Be sure to watch the New Life street sign, the New Life Lutheran Church website, or Facebook page for any updates or cancellations, or you can call the church office.

According to state guidelines and safe practices that are recommended the interior of the church buildings, including the restrooms, will not be open for use unless it is an emergency. Also according to the guidelines and safe practice recommendations, we will not be allowed to serve refreshments before, during, or after the services; we will not have bulletins (there will be an order of service posted on the church website if you would like to follow along at: newlifeparish.net), and we will not be able to celebrate Holy Communion due to safety concerns.

#### **Applying Bible Principles**

The Psalmist wrote, "So teach us to count our days that we may gain a wise heart" (Psalm 90:12).

Have you ever numbered your days? If an average lifetime is 70 years, multiply 70 times 365. The result is 25,550 days in 70 years. Add 17 extra days for the leap years in that period of time. The total number of days is 25,567.

To the teenager at age 14, on average, there are 20,454 days left. That seems like an inexhaustible supply. To the retiree at age 65, there are only 1,826 days left. That number doesn't seem so inexhaustible. In fact, it can seem downright small!

But what does it mean to "count our days"? Did the Psalmist have in mind merely counting the days that we may hope to have left in life? Not really. Notice the second phrase in Psalm 90:12 — "... that we may gain a wise heart." The purpose of numbering our days and of considering our days is that we might be wise in our use of whatever days God allows us to have. Just counting the days becomes a simple exercise in mathematics if it does not also cause us to consider **how** we are using our days.

The wise person will realize that time (which comprises the days of our lives) is limited.

The wise person will seek to accomplish as much as possible in terms of things that really matter for this life and the life to come.

The wise person will seek to use the resource of time in a manner befitting both Christian faith and experience.

The wise person will seek to make the most of time with the full realization that it could end at any moment.

The wise person will be diligent in the use of time in order to maximize his or her impact for the sake of the Gospel.

As you think about how you are using the time God has given to you, how wise are you?




